The Weaver of Stars

In the age before the sky had any pattern to it, the stars were scattered carelessly across the darkness, and travelers, farmers, and sailors alike often lost their way with no fixed points to guide them. In a village at the edge of a great forest lived a weaver named Isolde, known throughout the land for cloth so fine that people said it seemed woven from moonlight itself.

One night, an old traveler appeared at Isolde's door, cloaked and weary, asking for shelter from the cold. Isolde, though she had little to spare, gave the stranger her own bed and warmed what remained of her supper over the fire. In the morning, the traveler revealed herself to be an ancient spirit of the sky, testing the kindness of mortals below. As thanks, she offered Isolde a single wish.

Isolde did not ask for wealth or fame, though both were within the spirit's power to grant. Instead, she asked that no traveler ever again lose their way in the dark as so many had before her. The spirit considered this request for a long moment, then smiled and led Isolde outside beneath the scattered stars. Together, using threads pulled from Isolde's own loom, they wove the stars into fixed patterns across the sky, patterns that would never drift or fade: a hunter, a bear, a great winding river of light.

From that night forward, sailors could steer by the hunter's belt, and travelers could find true north by following the patterns Isolde had woven. The spirit offered to make Isolde immortal, to let her watch over her constellations forever, but Isolde chose instead to return to her loom and her ordinary life among the villagers she loved. It is said that on the clearest nights, if you look closely enough, you can still see a faint, silvery thread connecting each constellation, the last trace of the mortal weaver who first gave the sky its shape.
