The Quiet Hour

At exactly six o'clock every evening, a tone sounded across the city of Meridian, and every citizen fell silent for sixty uninterrupted minutes. The Quiet Hour, as it was called, had been law for as long as seventeen year old Ren could remember, introduced two generations earlier after what the official history called "the Noise Years," a chaotic period of arguments, protests, and what the government now referred to only as "unnecessary discord."

Ren had never questioned the Quiet Hour, not really, until the evening she noticed her grandmother's lips moving silently during the sixty minutes, shaping words with no sound behind them. When the tone finally released the city back into ordinary speech, Ren asked her grandmother what she had been saying. Her grandmother hesitated, glancing toward the window as though the walls themselves might be listening, then admitted quietly that she had been reciting a poem, one she had memorized as a girl, before poetry itself had quietly disappeared from the city's schools.

"Why would they take poetry away?" Ren asked, genuinely confused. Her grandmother's answer surprised her. "Poetry asks people to feel things out loud, together, at the same time. A room full of people feeling the same thing at once can decide to change something. It's much harder to organize sixty minutes of enforced silence into anything at all." Ren turned this idea over for days afterward, uncertain what to do with it, since nothing in her life had ever suggested there was anything to organize against in the first place.

The following week, during the Quiet Hour, Ren found herself moving her own lips silently, shaping words to a poem her grandmother had taught her that same evening. She did not fully understand yet what she was building toward, only that something in her

chest felt different than it had the day before, lighter and more dangerous at once. Outside her window, Meridian sat in its familiar, obedient silence, sixty minutes of nothing at all, and for the first time in her life, Ren wondered what the city might sound like if that silence ever truly broke.
